HEALTH FEST 2021

Innovative approach to conduct Community Service Learning

Given the prolonged movement restrictions which have led to sudden lifestyle changes and rising mental health concerns, innovative health promotion approaches are inevitable. As an effort to safeguard the community health and well-being while ensuring the Community Service Learning (CSL) could be pursued during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Department of Public Health Medicine, Universiti Teknologi MARA (UiTM), has conducted a virtual 'Health Fest UiTM 2021' from 28th July to 8th August 2021.

This community activity is part of the Service-Learning Malaysia-University for Society (SULAM) initiative that aims to provide students with the opportunity to contribute their knowledge, skills, and competencies in their specialized area toward solving problems within the community. Four different themes were selected to address the issues raised by the local community during the pandemic – COVID-19 immunization, mental health awareness, physical activity, and healthy eating, and domestic violence.

The event was conducted through various social networking sites such as Instagram, Facebook, YouTube, TikTok, Curious Cat, etc. The main objective of this health promotion program is to empower the community about health-related issues by sharing information through innovative educational materials consisting of infographic posters, videos, games, and online quizzes. In addition, the program also acts as a platform for medical students to improve their teamwork, professionalism, and leadership skills.

The COVID-19 pandemic has accelerated the integration of digital technology into the delivery of effective service-learning in providing access to health education and promotion. A substantial majority (>80%) of the community members were highly satisfied with the program and applauded the organizers for conducting the health education sessions and providing accessible education materials covering important health issues.

In addition, more than 85% of students felt that the program enhances their professional development, which may be geared towards improving their critical thinking, communication skills, teamwork, and leadership skill. The 10-day program receiving good engagement positive responses from the community has motivated the educators and healthcare providers the potential of a virtual health promotion program among a technology-literate population in Malaysia. 📋

370 We Care Kits were distributed amongst the healthcare professional

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused a significant burden and overutilization of the healthcare facilities in Malaysia. The country saw an exponential rise in the number of daily COVID-19 cases from 360 confirmed new cases on 1st October 2020 to 5728 new cases daily on 30th January 2021. The third wave of the pandemic saw the country clocking about 6000 to more than 24000 new cases daily beginning July 2021. Due to the worsening of the COVID-19 pandemic, CTC UiTM Sg Buloh and Hospital UiTM Puncak Alam are both involved in managing COVID-19 patients and non-COVID-19 patients referred from nearby Ministry of Health hospitals like Hospital Sg Buloh and Hospital Selayang. The workload of the UiTM healthcare professionals increased tremendously compared to the pre-COVID-19 period. The prolonged and endless battle has caused fatigue, stress, and to a certain extent, burnout among them. It could also lead to anxiety and depression.



The Department of Psychiatry Faculty of Medicine UiTM and Hospital UiTM, in collaboration with Life EduCare Foundation, a non-governmental organization for children with special needs, prepared a total of 370 We Care Kits. The kits were distributed amonast the professionals of CTC UiTM Sg Buloh, who were directly involved with taking care of COVID-19 patients admitted to the centre. The objectives of these We Care Kits were to provide some comfort, boost morale in daily work, make them feel appreciated, and most importantly, acknowledge their tireless efforts serving as the frontliners of the COVID-19 pandemic in Malaysia.

This outreach project has also provided better engagement with the healthcare professionals in the centre and allowed the Department of Psychiatry to promote mental health support and psychosocial services that were set up at the beginning of the pandemic in 2020, which ultimately aim to ensure healthy mental health among the UiTM staffs.




The We Care Kit consisted of items that members of the department felt would be useful for the healthcare professionals, such as drawstring bag, neck pillow, shower foam, shampoo, hand cream, chocolate bar, mineral water, canned coffee, and a thank you card. The children with special needs from Life EduCare Foundation had also made jars which were filled with thank you notes or gestures for the frontliners in CTC UiTM Sg Buloh.



The kits were distributed in 2 phases. For the first phase, 250 We Care Kits were distributed on the 26th August 2021 to staff in clinics, phlebotomy unit, ward 1 and ward 2, intensive care unit (ICU), and the emergency department. An additional 120 We Care Kits were distributed on 12th October 2021 in conjunction with World Mental Health Day 2021. In line with this year's slogan, "Mental health care for all: let's make it a reality," we extended the distribution of the kits in this phase to include ambulance drivers and auxiliary officers who are also frontliners during this pandemic.

Breast Imaging in Hospital UiTM

October is the month of breast cancer awareness and is popularly symbolized with the pink breast cancer awareness ribbon. This month is intended to empower women to step up their efforts in the prevention and early detection of breast cancer, primarily through regular mammograms and at the same time to support and celebrate breast cancer survivors.

Statistics from Malaysian National Cancer Registry showed that breast cancer is the most common cancer and accounts for 34.1% of all cancers amongst females in Malaysia. Screening mammography examination is recommended for early detection of breast cancer in women over 40. Unfortunately, the number of women undergoing screening mammograms in Malaysia is still low compared to developed countries like the United States. According to the National Health and Morbidity Survey in 2019, three in four women in Malaysia aged 40 and above never had a mammogram.

Department of Radiology HUiTM is equipped with digital breast tomosynthesis (DBT), an advanced form of mammogram where 3D images of the breast are produced to give more detailed information about the breast. DBT services in Hospital UiTM operate three days per week with three consultant breast radiologists and six trained radiographers.

During standard mammogram examination, two different views of the breast, which are the mediolateral oblique (MLO) and craniocaudal (CC) views, are obtained. First, the patient will need to stand facing the mammogram machine, and the breast will be placed on the detector plate. The compression paddle will then be firmly pressed onto the breast to hold it in place and spread out the breast tissues before taking the x-ray. Similar steps are repeated for the other breast.

A breast radiologist will review and reports the mammogram images. Additional ultrasound (US), if needed, will be performed on the same day. Any signs of breast cancer detected on mammograms or US will be further investigated.

#EARLY DETECTION SAVE LIVES

In conjunction with Pink October breast cancer awareness month, the Department of Radiology HUITM had successfully organized a Mammogram Screening Campaign for UiTM staff and the residents in the surrounding areas, including Kuala Selangor, Puncak Alam, Saujana Utama, and ljok. Interested women were asked to register online and were subsequently contacted via telephone. Appointments were scheduled to avoid crowding, in compliance with COVID operating department's standard procedure (SOP) during the pandemic.

Alhamdulillah, the campaign received an overwhelming response, with more than 300 women registered for screening mammograms. We managed to perform mammograms in 176 women in October. The rest of the women registered through the campaign will have mammograms from November until January 2022.

Of the 176 women screened on October,17 (9%) needed further evaluation with tissue biopsy. A total of 9 lesions were biopsied in October, with three confirmed to be cancers (33.3%).

In view of the overwhelming response and success, we plan to host this campaign annually to promote awareness of breast cancer, provide greater access to breast imaging services to the public and consequently contribute to the reduction of breast cancer mortality in Malaysia.

HUITM MOBILE PPV OUTREACH

NO ONE is SAFE from COVID-19 until EVERYONE is SAFE

Amid the relentless crippling claws of COVID-19, rose a community drive aimed to arm the 'already crippled' in society, with the only armor humanity has in its defense against a raging pandemic war: the COVID – 19 vaccine.

Inspired by a team of equally relentless primary care physicians, we embarked on a journey that took us from our campus clinic along city highways to a government health office and its neighboring health clinic, in the Selangor outskirts where the path was paved, to deliver the COVID -19 vaccine to the bedbound, immobilized, physically and mentally challenged: vulnerable members of our community, in areas of Kuala Selangor, Jeram and Puncak Alam.

In a beautiful like minded collaboration between HUiTM with PKD Kuala Selangor, Klinik Kesihatan Bukit Cherakah, and the Usiamas NGO, we finally stepped out with hearts full of hope and bags full of medical equipment, portable mini-ice-cold boxes, personal protection, medications, and documentation necessary, to achieve a safe and valid mobile vaccination exercise in the community.

This humble outreach, borne by sheer will and sustained by unflagging enthusiasm by its team members, rolled out on 13th September 2021 and has covered 11 mobile vaccine trips. A typical outreach would span half a day, starting bright and early at 7:30 am from Klinik 3, Sungai Buloh Campus, with a driver always arriving promptly from university transport services. In addition, we were accompanied by a dedicated team of volunteer nurses and allied health, taking turns among our team members and volunteering fellow lecturers and trainees.



A team would usually comprise two primary care physicians and three nurses, chugging along in a van, traversing a short highway, and into the outskirts of Jeram, Selangor, to make our first pit stop at Klinik Kesihatan Bukit Cherakah. Here, we would collect vaccine supplies and meticulously ensure cold chains in portable ice-cold boxes until they reached our vaccines. Then, guided by the Usiamas NGO team, we would take a scenic drive into dense oil palm plantations, passing cattle and poultry farms to the identified vaccine homes.

If the walls of these half wood, half brick homes could speak, they would whisper stories of poverty and quiet suffering, borne gallantly by these frail yet sweet elderlies having endured years of physical deformity and debilitating illnesses. The young we encountered were either immobilized by trauma, chronic medical conditions, or mental health issues. Yet, they were faces of steadfast resilience surrounded by their offspring of tender ages.

Grateful families would bid us farewell with smiling faces of relief, not knowing how much more we wanted to reach out to them at this unprecedented time of need.

Our efforts were also willingly extended to cater for the foreign workers settled amongst these oil palm plantations via the Usiamas NGO team, which saw yet another fulfilling experience for us to serve the community regardless of race or creed.





Till date, we have successfully vaccinated 31 citizens and 35 foreign workers from the surrounding areas mentioned throughout a drive that ran strong for a good two months since its commencement.

The fight against COVID 19 is far from over. We are in this for the long haul. Our mission as health care workers is clear, and our journey is arduous as we continue to stand together to tackle the formidable foe of a generation.



Various activities were done such as Kecek-Kecek Ambo, Selawat Challenge, Creative Dakwah, Daily Sunnah and Maulidur Rasul Talk by Ustaz Don Daniyal Don Bijayid.

Kecek-kecek Ambo was made into three series and held on an Instagram live platform, with each series led by brilliant panels and moderators among ALIS members. Daily sunnah was a social media program where we shared posters regarding the sunnah of Prophet Muhammad as a reminder to be implemented among students in their daily lives. Selawat challenges progress through the festival of Maulidur Rasul every day, where we encourage students to share posters of selawat.

Lastly, creative dakwah is a contest in which participants post any video or poster on Instagram based on the theme "Amanah Membentuk Insan Beradab "that includes hashtags to heat the vibe of Maulidur Rasul.

The highlight of Maulidur Rasul Programme this year was the talk Dahsyatnya Cinta Rasulullah by Ustaz Don Daniyal Don Biyajid entitled "Sudahkah Kita Membalas Cintanya" which was done on 23rd October 2021 via Facebook live and YouTube live. He concluded that love for the prophet Muhammad needs to be nurtured and honed every day because we will be resurrected together with the people we love, love the prophet Muhammad more than ourselves and remember the prophet Muhammad with selawat upon him.

Alhamdulillah, this collaboration has met with success. We also agreed that such programs should be held occasionally, looking at the need to convey awareness to the community.
